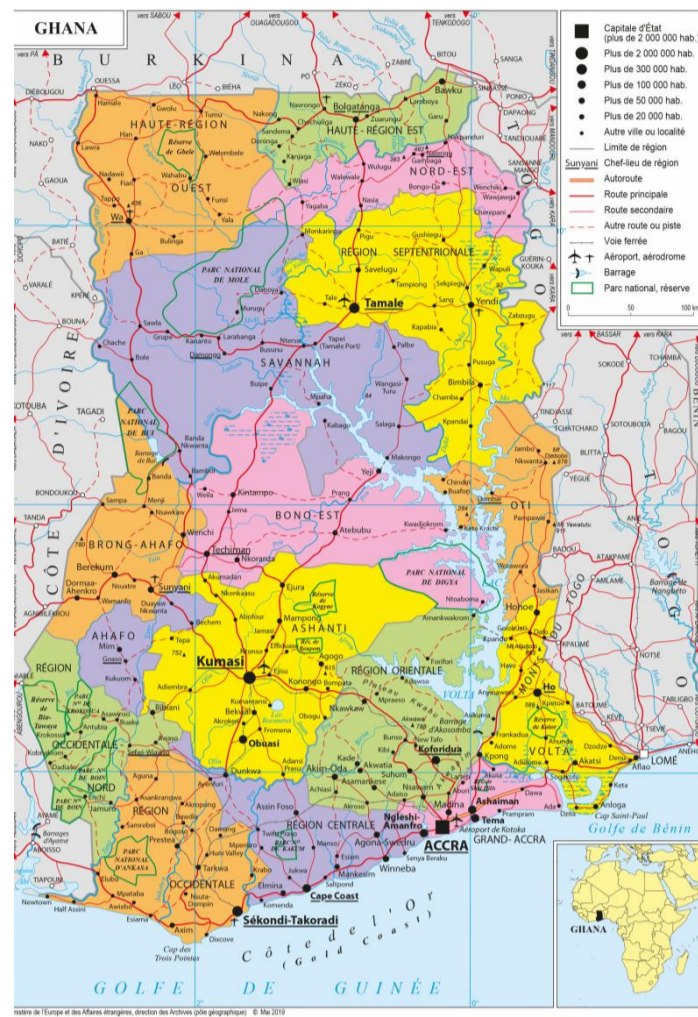

## Must See Destinations

### Coastal Heritage and Adventure

#### Labadi & Kokrobite Beaches (late 20<sup>th</sup> Century)

Two of Ghana's most popular coastal attractions, known for their golden sands, lively atmosphere, and stunning ocean views. Labadi Beach offers music, entertainment, and vibrant cultural experiences, while Kokrobite is loved for surfing, relaxation, and its artistic, laid-back community; perfect destinations for leisure seekers and ocean lovers.



#### Cape Coast Castle & Elmina Castle

The Cape Coast Castle, built in 1653 is a UNESCO World Heritage Site and one of the most important historical structures of the Trans-Atlantic Slave Trade. Expanded by European powers over centuries, Cape Coast Castle now serves as a museum and memorial, offering powerful guided tours through underground dungeons and the "Door of No Return." It stands as a solemn reminder of resilience, human rights, and the enduring strength of the African spirit.



The oldest European building in Sub-Saharan Africa, constructed by the Portuguese in 1482. Also recognized as a UNESCO World Heritage Site, Elmina Castle was a major hub in the slave trade era. Today, it is a historic landmark where visitors reflect on the past while appreciating Ghana's renewed journey of freedom, unity, and liberation.



#### Kakum National Park & Canopy Walkway

It is one of Ghana's most famous ecotourism destinations, home to lush tropical rainforest and diverse wildlife. Its iconic Canopy Walkway, suspended 40 metres above ground, offers breathtaking views above the treetops. The park is a symbol of Ghana's commitment to conservation, adventure, and sustainable tourism.



#### Nzulezu Stilt Village

A remarkable village built entirely on stilts above Lake Tadane, showcasing a unique water-based lifestyle and architectural ingenuity. Visitors glide along the lake in canoes to reach the community, experiencing traditional culture closely connected to nature. Nzulezu is a symbol of resilience, creativity, and harmonious coexistence with the environment. It is a standout destination in Ghana's ecotourism landscape.



#### Cape Three Points

The southernmost point of Ghana, where the Gulf of Guinea meets the Atlantic Ocean. Marked by an iconic lighthouse originally built in 1875, Cape Three Points offers spectacular coastal views and opportunities to explore scenic beaches and fishing communities. Known as the "land nearest to the centre of the world," it is a perfect spot for ocean lovers, photographers, and explorers.



## Nature & Wildlife Encounters

### Lake Bosomtwe

Formed by a meteor impact over a million years ago, Lake Bosomtwe is Ghana's only natural lake, created by a meteorite impact. Considered sacred by the Asante people, the lake is believed to be a resting place for souls. Its calm waters make it ideal for boating, swimming, hiking, birdwatching, and eco-tourism.

### Mole National Park

Established in 1971, Mole National Park is Ghana's largest wildlife reserve, offering close-up encounters with elephants, antelopes, buffalos, baboons, and over 300 bird species. Visitors can enjoy walking and jeep safaris guided by trained rangers, with breathtaking views from the Mole Lodge.

### Kyabobo National Park

Located along the Togo border, Kyabobo National Park blends lush forest and savannah landscapes with rugged mountains and breathtaking viewpoints. The park is home to elephants, antelopes, primates, and over 500 bird species, making it ideal for wildlife lovers and adventure seekers. Visitors can hike Mount Dzebobo (Ghana's 2<sup>nd</sup> highest peak), explore scenic trails, enjoy mountain biking.

### Paga Crocodile Pond

It is a world-famous eco-spiritual heritage site where crocodiles live peacefully among humans. These friendly and sacred crocodiles are believed to embody the souls of ancestors, ensuring utmost respect and protection. Visitors can safely interact with the crocodiles under expert guidance, making it a unique cultural encounter found nowhere else in the world.

### Bia National Park & Resource Reserve (UNESCO Biosphere Reserve)

A pristine rainforest conservation area representing one of West Africa's most important biodiversity hotspots. Bia National Park is home to rare primates, forest elephants, and exceptional birdlife. Visitors experience guided hikes, wildlife viewing, and environmental education in a serene, untouched natural setting. A leading destination for ecotourism and scientific research.

### Mount Afadja (Afadjato)

Standing at about 885 meters, Mount Afadja is Ghana's highest peak. The hike offers refreshing adventure through lush vegetation with scenic views of surrounding mountains and nearby Togolese landscapes. A rewarding climb for nature lovers, trekkers, and photography enthusiasts.

### Boabeng-Fiema Monkey Sanctuary

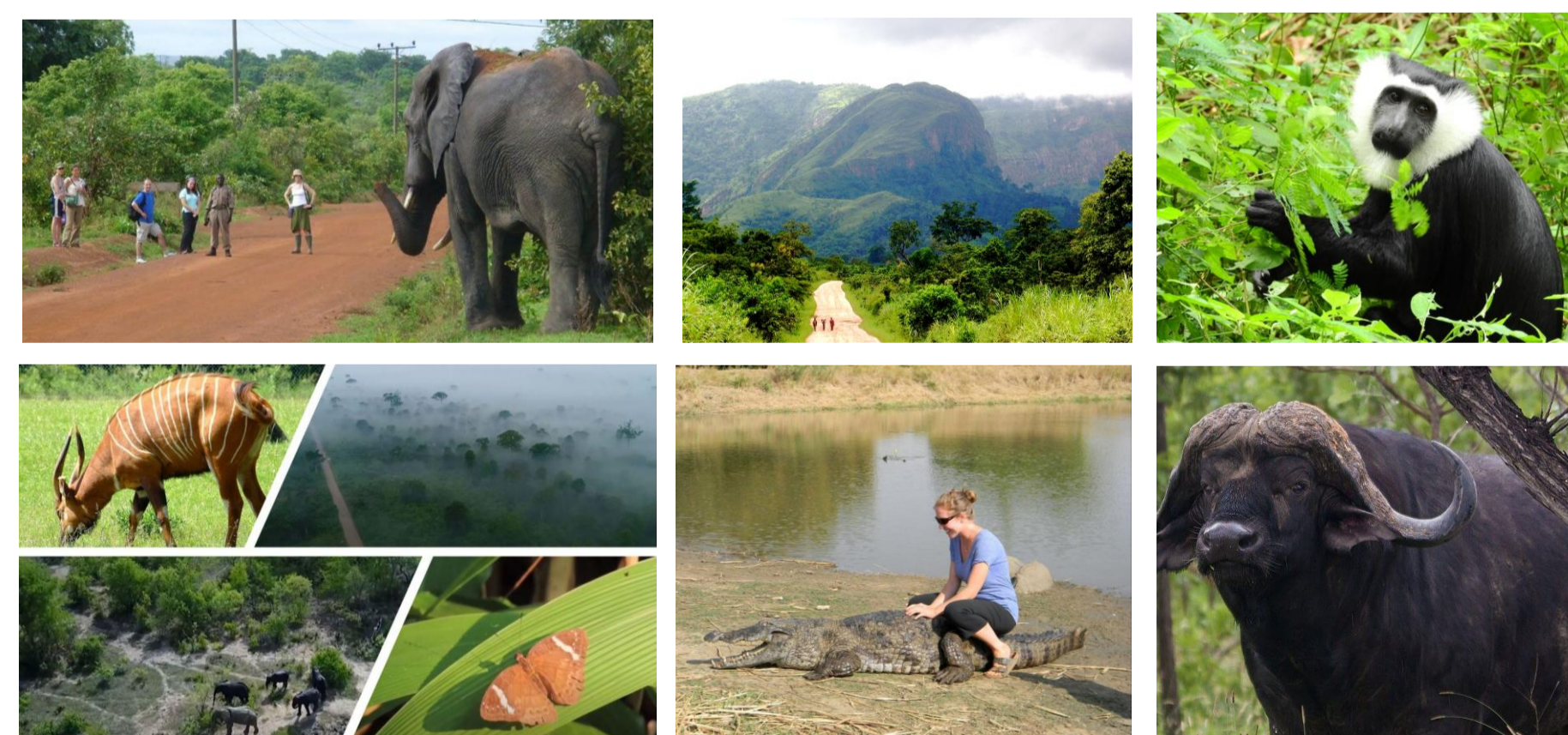
This sanctuary is home to sacred Geoffrey's Pied colobus and Mona monkeys, protected by local traditional beliefs for generations. Visitors witness a rare peaceful co-existence between humans and wildlife, enjoy guided forest walks, and learn about rich cultural conservation practices.

### Kintampo Waterfalls & Fuller Falls

These two stunning waterfalls provide refreshing scenery along the Black Volta River system. Kintampo Waterfalls features multi-tiered cascades set within a cool forested area perfect for hiking and relaxation. Fuller Falls, nearby, offers a more tranquil alternative for picnics and eco-adventure lovers.

### Boti Waterfalls & Umbrella Rock

Located near Koforidua, Boti Waterfalls features twin falls known locally as the male and female. Best viewed in the rainy season, the falls are surrounded by lush forest trails and local legends. A short hike leads to the remarkable Umbrella Rock, a natural rock formation shaped like a giant umbrella with panoramic views of the landscape offering both adventure and unforgettable scenery.

## Cultural & Royal Traditions

### Kwame Nkrumah Mausoleum & Park (1992)

A national monument dedicated to Osagyefo Dr. Kwame Nkrumah, the first President and a key leader of Africa's independence movement. The mausoleum features his final resting place, statues, fountains, and a museum showcasing his life, legacy, and Pan-African achievements; a must-visit symbol of Ghana's freedom and global influence.

### Independence Square & Black Star Gate (1961)

One of Africa's largest public squares and the proud centerpiece of Ghanaian sovereignty. Built to commemorate Ghana's independence in 1957, it features the iconic Black Star Gate, symbolizing African unity and freedom. The square hosts national parades and ceremonies, celebrating Ghana's democratic spirit and continued progress.



### Larabanga Mosque (oldest in Ghana)

Dating back to 1421, the Mosque is Ghana's oldest and most revered Islamic structure, built in the Sudano-Sahelian architectural style using mud and timber. Known as the "Mecca of West Africa," it represents centuries of cultural and religious heritage. It offers visitors a deep connection to history, tradition, and Ghana's spiritual identity.



### Manhyia Palace Museum

Located in Kumasi, the historic capital of the Ashanti people, Manhyia Palace is the official residence and cultural seat of the Asantehene, King of the Ashanti Kingdom. Visitors can explore the Museum, which displays royal regalia, historic photographs, and artefacts that tell the story of the Ashanti Empire, its resistance to colonial rule, and its enduring cultural influence.
